In the last Newsletter I shared a story about a father's wish for his child and his education. I've received some very positive comments about the piece and I'm glad that it was received so positively. I would like to continue this week with the notion that we are the greatest influencers of our children. We must instil in our children their inner voice.

"You must strive to find your own voice because the longer you wait to begin, the less likely you are to find it at all." Robin Williams as John Keating in Dead Poets Society.

Our children are our future. We want them to be successful human beings. I know, as a parent, that you want the best for your children. Here, at Edensor Park Public School, we want the very best for your children as well. We need to teach our children resilience and by doing this, we are giving them the very best and setting them up for life.

Some of these strategies could be:

Playtime.

Children need this. It is their work. Playtime helps them solve problems, negotiate, try ideas and learn how to self regulate. Playtime can be structured activities, such as their local sporting club, or it can be unstructured, like playing in the backyard or at the local park. At lot of positive outcomes are linked with play – an increase in cognitive skills, physical health and social skills are some of these.



Downtime.

Children need downtime throughout their day for their general physical and emotional health and wellbeing. Downtime can be categorised as not do anything much – it could be listening to music, reading a book, watching a TV show, or simply spending some time outside with nature. This 'time' gives children time to relax before getting started on homework or their next activity. I also think sleep should come under this category, for sleep is just so important for a growing child.



Family Time.

This is so important. It's important for adults and children to know that family time provides us with a significant protective factor. When the family spends time together, they are more likely to feel supported, safe and loved unconditionally. This is no matter what age of the children.

Some people have labelled this a fresh approach to working together. I think this is common sense and if we provide time for all three of these important factors, we are setting up our children for every success in their future. We can't ask for more than that!

By the end of the session we were professionals!
















Our last lesson was with Mr Brown who is a history teacher and archaeologist. He taught us about the importance of the Roman Army.


Book Week

Book Character Parade



SCHOOL ZONE PARKING OFFENCES

Police are urging parents and motorist to slow down in school zones.

Schools zones are areas around schools where, at certain times, motorist need to reduce their speed to 40km/hour from 8.00am to 9.30am, 2.30pm to 4.00pm.

Speed limits, pick up, and drop off, parking rules exist to keep children, parents and care givers safe. These rules also apply to prevent traffic jams around schools.

Fairfield Crime Prevention officer, Senior Constable Ece Hasan, offers some safety tips for parents and motorists as police will be monitoring school zone offences very closely. Parents and motorists need to comply with these traffic rules or traffic infringement notices may be issued for non compliance.

- Let your children off on specified drop off /pick up zones, or on the side of the road. Never stop in the middle of the road to let down children.
- Never let your children cross the road on their own, always meet your children at the schools entrance
- Never call out to your child from the other side or the road as the child may run across the road without looking for cars
- Always walk your child across the road and ensure you use the pedestrian crossing
- Try to leave home early to avoid arriving at peak hour where traffic is heavy
- Park a safe distance from all crossings to enable pedestrians to see on coming vehicles
- Do not double park as this can create traffic jams, and accidents
- Always obey the directions of all signs.

SCHOOL ZONE PARKING OFFENCES

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Current as at 1 July 2015



Means that in the area in the direction of the arrow, you must NOT STOP your vehicle at any point on the road or kerb, unless there is a medical or other emergency.

Maximum Penalty

\$425

+ 2 Demerit Points



Means that you have no more than 2 minutes for drop-offs or pick-ups of passengers or goods and the driver must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle. Penalty

\$177

+ 2 Demerit Points



Means that in the direction of the arrow or arrows you are not allowed to stop your vehicle unless you are driving a bus. Penalty

\$319

+ 2 Demerit Points



DOUBLE PARKING

You are NOT PERMITTED to stop or park your vehicle alongside another vehicle that is already parked parallel to the kerb. Penalty

\$319

+ 2 Demerit Points

- STOP in a NO STOPPING zone: \$319 + 2 Demerit Points
- STOP on or near a Children's or Pedestrian Crossing (within 20m on approach & 10m on departure side of crossing): \$425 + 2 Demerit Points
- STOP on path/strip in built up area: \$177 + 2 Demerit Points

<u>Please Note:</u> fines subject to change without notice.

These penalties apply to offences in school zones only while the zone is active.
